Biosketch

Dr. Dallas has a national/international reputation in toxicology, pharmacology, toxic torts, radiation issues, risk assessment, crisis management, indoor air quality, neurotoxicity, drug analysis, and emergency preparedness and response, including over 30 years of experience. Dr. Dallas has received a total of over 11 million dollars in funding as Principal Investigator over the past decade. For seven years, he was the Director of one of the largest University interdisciplinary toxicology programs in the country, with 40 professors at the University of Georgia. For five years he was the Director of a Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Center in Public Health Preparedness. This Center has now become the Institute for Disaster Management, and is tasked with the emergency management exercises for all hospitals and a total of 700 stakeholders in the state of Georgia, in addition to national research responsibilities. Dr. Dallas also has extensive national and international presentation and production media experience (CNN, FOX, CBS), including hosting 40 episodes of his own television series on medicine/public health.
